

The Unity Quiver: Youth Archery's Role in Brief National Political Harmony

Simply turning on the television or scrolling on your cellphone is all it takes to immerse yourself in the divided political landscape of our nation. Recently an unexpected unifier — youth archery — became a catalyst and one of the eventual unifying forces in the polarized political environment of the United States. Over the course of several months, people from different political viewpoints came together in an instantaneous show of support for youth shooting sports.

After a wave of school shootings, federal legislators created the Bipartisan Safe Communities Act (BPSCA) in the fall of 2022. This legislation was intended to increase support for school and community safety and help mitigate tragedies like the one in Uvalde, Texas. Although the BPSCA was written with the best of intentions, educators were soon faced with some unintended consequences due to the language within the legislation.

In late spring of 2023, several schools in Alaska were contemplating the launch of the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP®). Following the actions of other states, they were considering using funds from the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) to train teachers as instructors for this program. Prior to the utilization of the federal money, the schools sought guidance from the United States Department of Education. After reviewing the language of the BPSCA, representatives of the USDE provided guidance that archery instruction, hunter education, or any other similar training involving the use of "deadly weapons" would be prohibited for the use of ESEA funds under the terms of the BPSCA.

The result of this guidance soon became public, and immediately almost every organization related to conservation or the shooting sports was discussing the issue – with NASP® at the forefront.

In late spring of '23, several schools in Alaska were looking to launch NASP® and considering the use of funds from the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) to train teachers as instructors. After reviewing the language of the BPSCA, representatives of the USDE provided guidance that archery instruction, hunter education, or any other similar training involving the use of "deadly weapons" would be prohibited for the use of ESEA funds under the terms of the BPSCA.

This set off a firestorm that played out in the national media with NASP® and President Tommy Floyd in the middle of what eventually resulted in a piece of legislation, HR5110, which clearly stated federal funds could be used for the promotion of hunter education and youth shooting sports such as NASP®! The bill quickly passed with just a single dissenting vote and the President signed it into law. Here is an Op Ed article that Tommy Floyd penned recounting the events.

What began as a trickle of communication, soon became a torrent of concern, confusion, and disbelief. Many wondered how these long proven and safe programs could contrast with the intention of the BPSCA and be out of bounds for the use of federal funds.

Staff members from several congressional offices soon began to reach out to NASP® and hunter education organizations and others to gain insight on the impact of these programs on millions of school-age students. Conservation groups and Directors of Fish and Wildlife agencies soon developed talking points on the value of these programs on the future of conservation efforts and advised federal legislators on possible solutions.

Parents, grandparents, foster families, and mentors of all kinds also began contacting their federal representatives to explain what these programs have done and continue to do for their students. They begged for solutions to this new barrier potentially blocking the expansion of these valuable programs.

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The groundswell of support for a solution might have begun as a trickle, but soon became a mighty unified voice from urban, suburban, and rural origins. For weeks, the developing situation was covered daily by multiple media outlets.

Finally, legislators acted. Support started flowing from both sides of the political aisles and legislators began drafting bills to submit for potential resolutions. One piece of legislation, HR5110, rose above all others with support from the nation's most respected conservation and shooting sports organizations. HR5110 established language where federal funds could be used for the promotion of hunter education and youth shooting sports such as NASP®. Once HR5110 was introduced in the house, it passed rapidly with only one opposing vote. The bill quickly passed in the consent agenda of the senate and a few days later, the president signed it into law.

HR5110 became one of the most rapidly approved legislative actions related to the shooting sports in recent times. In a nation divided on issues involving guns, gun violence and student safety, why did archery instruction and hunter education matter so much to so many people from so many walks of life?

The answer lies in a simple truth: Archery and the shooting sports are transformative in the lives of the young people who participate. Millions of students receive instruction in archery, shotgun, rifle, air rifle, and hunter education across the nation every year. These programs provide multiple benefits to young people including:

- A lifelong understanding of the paramount need for safety.
- An understanding of the need for personal accountability and responsibility.
- A foundation in the value and promotion of sportsmanship and ethics.
- Persistence through the process where marksmanship skills develop.
- Experience in dealing with pressure from various competitions.
- The value of becoming a contributing member of a team—many for the first time.
- A lifelong commitment to the value of conservation and the continuation of the outdoor lifestyle.

Students acquire these benefits through interaction with a coach, mentor or sponsor who often volunteers their time to work with students in the shooting sports or in hunter education instruction. Millions of adults in communities large and small give of their time and effort to work with young people in these disciplines. They develop long lasting relationships and become someone of relevance. Through the instruction of various disciplines over the course of weeks or months, they help students not only become proficient in their chosen discipline, but they soon help many make academic and behavioral improvements. They form relationships that outlast graduation and transcend into adulthood.

Perhaps, it was this "truth" alone that led so many individuals to contact their federal representative. Perhaps they knew that through their time with kids in the shooting sports, they were making a difference with students that otherwise might not have anyone else in that role. Perhaps they simply wanted as many students as possible to have the opportunity to experience what they had seen—transformative positive change through participation in archery and other shooting sports. Perhaps, it was this "truth" that brought red and blue together, Democrat and Republican.

From our perspective, this situation embodies what may still be the best of America; it demonstrates how people of different perspectives can unite to eliminate barriers for students. We believe that this situation illustrates just how deeply Americans care about the future of conservation and the preservation of the youth shooting sports.







How did AA get started? In November of 2015, National NASP® leadership and a group of NASP® educators and students met to discuss ways to further enhance the almost 22 year old program. One recommendation was to establish a uniform incentive and recognition format to recognize and promote academic achievement among participating NASP® students.

The Academic Archer program was established to recognize student success in the classroom as well as on the archery range.



In November of 2015, National NASP® leadership and a group of NASP® educators and students met to discuss ways to further enhance the program. One recommendation was to establish a uniform incentive and recognition format to recognize and promote academic achievement among participating NASP® students. That's how the annual Academic Achievement Awards came to be.

Knowing that students love shooting NASP®, educators can use this love of archery to promote and recognize better outcomes in the classroom. Many times, students who are on the "bubble" of performing better academically find archery as the reason to give the extra effort needed succeed academically. The Academic Achievement Awards recognize those students who achieve both in the classroom as well as on the shooting line.

NASP® Schools that participate in the Academic Achievement Program can utilize the downloadable Academic Archer certificates to recognize their student-archers during their annual academic awards ceremonies.

NASP® recognizes the special people involved in the program and encourages giving back.

On Target For Life is the NASP® recognition program that allows us to recognize and celebrate the special people that do special things as part of NASP®.



We've created six unique award categories that allow us to bring the deserved attention to these special students, teams, coaches, volunteers and alumni. The candidates are nominated by those around them and their story is submitted to NASP® for consideration. All of the winners are then presented their On Target For Life Awards prior to the National Tournament Award Presentation

- 1 Community Service Award (Team Award)
- 2 Bullseye Award (Student Award)
- 3 Superhero Award (Volunteer Award)
- **4** Courage Award (Student Award)
- **5** Outstanding Alumni Award (Alumni Award)
- **6** Coach of the Year (Coach/Educator Award)



Two of the most popular youth archery organizations, the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP®) and Scholastic 3-D Archery (S3DA®), partnered together for a second year to host a virtual fundraiser to support St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

The two programs partnered together during the month of January and encouraged all schools, clubs, and teams to participate. Donations were made by archers, parents, family and friends in the name of the school or team on the tournament website.



Each year a shoot-off is held at the NASP® Championship with scholarships being awarded to the top 5 male and female archers from the national tournaments.



In addition, 20 participants are awarded random \$500 scholarships.

At Nationals (Eastern and Western combined), scholarships are also awarded to the members of the top three teams:

Up to 24 1st place High School team members will receive a **\$1,000 scholarship.**

Up to 24 2nd place High School team members will receive a **\$750 scholarship.**

Up to 24 3rd place High School team members will receive a **\$500 scholarship.**

Additionally, 100 random \$500 scholarships are awarded to participants.

Finally, NASP® matches state tournament scholarships up to \$10,000 per state.

In 2022-2023, twelve states took advantage of this \$10k match!

Bring NASP® to your School.

Take steps to learn if NASP® is the right program for your school and how to implement NASP® curriculum.

STEP **1**

Seek leadership or administration support & approval.

We have found the most beneficial NASP® programs start with the full support of the school administration.

Your interest in bringing NASP® to a new school can aid in improving educational performance amongst students by introducing life lessons required to be successful in the classroom and in life. We believe NASP® is especially attractive to previously under served student populations. The school principal's familiarity with staff may be key to identifying the "ideal" educator to run the required in-school program.

STEP 2

Select passionate educators to lead NASP® lessons.

NASP®, like educators, is passionate about helping kids. NASP® archery lessons provide a new avenue to positively engage students, and has proven to engage a demographic of students that have yet to be reached.

NASP® lessons are normally conducted in Physical Education, but also have curriculum designed for Social Studies and Mathematics. Physical, emotional and social benefits can be gained from archery. In addition, safety strategies, skills and archery techniques necessary to participate in, and enjoy, archery as a lifetime activity will be fully addressed.

STEP 3

With administrator approval, register educators and volunteers who will instruct archery.

Basic Archery Instructor (BAI) certification was developed for instructors to present NASP® lessons that are safe for students, instructors, bystanders, and the facility.

This training will show you how to safely set up the range, teach the program and maintain equipment.

It is always a good idea to train multiple people at a school. In addition to the teacher that will be teaching the archery class in school, you can also train interested parents, coaches (for an after-school program/team), and other faculty at the school.

STEP

Order equipment, set-up your range and start shooting!
